



Two months before he died in June of 1963, Pope St. John XXIII wrote his "Easter gift" to the Church and to the whole world.

A SPECIAL CHARISM FOUND AT POPE ST. JOHN XXIII

In our Second Theology year (prior to the pandemic), men at Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary are sent out once a week to health care assignments, focusing on ministering to patients in hospitals and residents in long-term care facilities. A couple years ago, fellow seminarian Stephen

Ondrey and I arrived at our usual time, a few minutes before 9 a.m., to begin another Tuesday shift at St. Patrick's Manor in Framingham.

However, on this particular winter morning, Shirley, the receptionist, was not her cheery self. I immediately knew something was amiss when I caught a glance of the somber look on her face as she hung up the front desk phone. "A resident just died in her room a few minutes ago," she informed us, "Could you two go up and talk with her daughter?" A priest was called, but had yet to arrive. At least we were dressed like priests, in any event. As we climbed the stairs on our way to the room, I was nervous. What should I do? What should I say? I had assisted at wakes and funerals in summer pastoral assignments, but had never been first on the scene, so to speak, following a death.

Upon entering, Stephen and I greeted the grieving daughter. I asked her to tell us about her mother, whose body laid in bed. She replied that her mom loved to travel around the world, even into her early 80s. She told us stories about some of the different places her mother went, and the joy it gave her. We said some prayers together before we departed from the scene, as more family members were on their way.

To be honest, I don't recall the name of the mother or the daughter. But what I do remember is being present to a person in need. The Holy Spirit was at work bringing comfort to this woman in mourning, and to have served as an instrument of God's healing presence is something I will never forget. It reinforced for me that this is what I am called to do.

Looking back on this moment, something Fr. Brian Kiely, our rector at Pope St. John XXIII, preached resonates. He said, "People don't care how much you know. They need to know how much you care." Although academics are one of the pillars of formation for the men studying at Pope St. John, I believe the special

charism of this seminary is preparing men to be priests with the heart of Christ.


One of the distinct challenges for Pope St. John is forming men who have lived full and successful lives. I can attest, as a middle-aged man, that we can be stubborn and become stuck in our ways! But this doesn't mean we are resistant to formation. In fact, the men I attend class, share laughs, and break bread with are exceedingly committed to becoming, in Sherry Weddell's phraseology, intentional disciples. Christian discipleship is challenging in an American society that increasingly seeks not freedom of religion, but freedom from religion. Our life experience will help us, as soon-to-be pastors, lead others through these hazardous cultural waters by focusing our eyes, hearts, and minds on the Light that will guide us through the fiercest of storms.

Our English word vocation comes from the Latin term vocare, meaning "to call." Although vocations at Pope St. John XXIII are sometimes referred to as "delayed" or "late," these words have somewhat negative connotations. I prefer "mature." We are mature men seeking to discern God's will in our lives. For many of us, God willing, our call is to serve the Church as holy priests. For Jesus, there is no correct time frame when to answer his call. No vocation is delayed.

A priest back home in the Diocese of Albany, who in the past assisted with vocations, told me one of the unofficial tests for him when he met with a discerner was whether or not he would be comfortable with this man ministering to his own mother on her death bed. This brings me back to the encounter at St. Patrick's Manor two years ago. What if it were my mother who was dying or had just died, laying in that bed? Would I want a priest trained at Pope St. John XXIII to anoint her or to console me? I can honestly answer, without hesitation, "Yes, to a man!"


CARMINE CARUSO Archdiocese of New York





JOHN DUDEK



Diocese of Venice



Brannon will be ordained June 26, 2021 at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Oklahoma City, OK.





Dan was ordained June 19, 2021 at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Albany, NY.




STEPHEN ONDREY Diocese of Columbus




BR. STEPHEN SHANAHAN, OCSO






Sister Mary Jude Waters, O.P. Steps Into Retirement

Brannon Lepak '21 sat down with Sr. Mary Jude Waters, O.P. to have a conversation on the occasion of her retirement from Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary. Sr. Mary Jude has been a wonderful asset to our community for a number of years. We are thrilled for her on the occasion of her well-deserved R & R, and we are delighted to share her story with you. In her own words...

I came to Pope Saint John XXIII National Seminary with a long history in Catholic Education: teaching grade one in Louisville

Kentucky; teaching math and science at North Cambridge Catholic High School and as a member of the educational development team at the Catholic School Office for the Archdiocese of Boston. I also served for two terms on the leadership team for my congregation, the Dominican Sisters of Saint Catherine of Siena.

I grew up in Springfield, Kentucky, a small town in the central part of the state. The parish in the town was name

for Saint Dominic, as was the local elementary school. It was a three-mile bus ride to and from school. Saint Catherine Academy was located at the mother house of the Dominican Sisters who taught in the schools. In fact, it was there on Cartwright Creek in Washington County where the first congregation of Dominican sisters in the United States was established in 1822. All of this was a strong influence in my choice of a religious congregation.

I studied at Spalding College in Louisville, Kentucky, before entering the Dominicans. After being sent to teach at North Cambridge Catholic, I received masters and doctoral degrees at Syracuse University and Boston College.

In the spring of 2005, there was an administrative assistant position opening and the Seminary was preparing to initiate its

self-study for reaccreditation with the Association of Theological Schools. Then Father Peter Uglietto (now Bishop) who was assuming the position of Rector asked me to consider the position as his Administrative Assistant and to coordinate the self-study for the 2008 reaccreditation visit. I had just finished approximately 20 years at the Catholic Schools Office and was ready to look at something new. So, I came!

I have ministered here at the Seminary for 16 years and worked with three Rectors. In those 16 years I have seen over 250 semi-

> narians enter Pope Saint John XXIII and begin the preparation for priesthood. I watched a faithful faculty teach and enable the formation of the seminarians and seen changes in a dedicated staff. It is the people who make an institution what it is, and the seminarians, along with faculty and staff, certainly contribute to the atmosphere of welcome and hospitality that is the hallmark of the Pope St.

John XXIII.



A COURSE REQUIREMENT INSPIRES AN AUTHOR



If you polled the men at Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary about what they did over Christmas break, you would hear answers such as, "I spent time with my family," or "I helped out in my home parish." However, for Deacon Brannon Lepak, a fourth-year theology student from the

Archdiocese of Oklahoma City, the 2020 Christmas season proved a fruitful time to write a book.

Inspired by his research into the eschatological literature of the Bible during a fall semester Johannine writings course, Lepak penned a short novel entitled The Apocalypse of Darrel. The titular character is a maker of kaleidoscopes, who along with his business partner, the lens maker Cassie, lovingly create intricate devices which allow people to see the natural world and its phenomena in new and wondrous ways. Lepak says his book is about "trying to seek God or trying to seek the thing that's beyond us," despite the difficulties and limitations we have as human beings. The story reflects the fact that man is "meant for eternity, but here we are bumbling along and trying to get along with each other and not always doing a very good job of it."

As any youngster can attest, a kaleidoscope is a scientific gadget with mystery baked into its essence. "I've always liked science and the idea of telescopes and microscopes where you can see the wonders of creation," Lepak said. "It leads me more and more towards God."


One of the recipients of Darrel's kaleidoscopes is the boy Arkar, whose name in Burmese means "sky." It is also a name which evokes the covenantal relationship between God and man. His mother Shampu, a refugee who escaped the bloody conflict in

the country known today as Myanmar, suffers a number of hardships as she struggles to make ends meet in the United States. "They kind of become a Mary and Christ image," Lepak noted. In addition to Christian sources of inspiration, the story was also informed by the author's personal experiences. Prior to entering the formation program at Pope St. John XXIII, the Oklahoma native taught English as a Second Language (ESL) in his home state, and later in New York City and Japan. He also discerned his vocation for three years with the Dominicans before embarking on his journey to become a diocesan priest. "Each of the characters shares some moment or insight that actually comes from my own life," Lepak said, "They each speak to something that I've seen or experienced somewhere on the path to get here."

The soon-to-be priest, a lifelong enthusiast of literature and languages, counts J.R.R. Tolkien, Flannery O'Connor, C.S. Lewis, and Kawabata among his literary favorites. Lepak explained that Kawabata, the twentieth-century Japanese novelist, was a particular stylistic influence on the writing of The Apocalypse of Darrel: "He writes in a very concise way where he doesn't say everything but he implies a lot. I try to do that also in this work."

Although locating the works of authors like Tolkien on Amazon is a cinch, finding Brannon Lepak's book will require some more

effort. That's because the deacon decided to use a pen name, Bunch Kapelman. Created by combining his childhood moniker, Bunch, with his last name spelled backwards—which coincidentally is also the Dutch word for chapel, kapel—Lepak said he does not plan on this book being his last. Here's hoping Mr. Kapelman will write a bunch more!






PRO-LIFE WITNESS CONTINUES STRONG
