

The community bond is important, as their work gives life and hope to many who attempt to cross the border in search of a better life. Fr. Murphy works alongside people of other faiths as they strive to provide dignity and comfort to families. Some of these services are as basic as a shower, food, clothing, and immigration help, but also as meaningful as remembering those who died in their attempt to cross the border. As noted in a local publication, Fr. Murphy's ministry is influenced and best summed up as being "nourished by the thought that the Holy Family were once migrants."

immersion program at Gallaudet University which enabled him to learn American Sign Language and later work with different deaf communities in Hartford, CT; Poughkeepsie, NY and Brooklyn, NY.

"Since my childhood as an altar server, my family has always been my backbone through prayers, encouragement and inspiration in my vocation. When I came to the U.S. as an immigrant, I was waiting for my papers to be approved. It was a long process, and during this time I felt that God's will has always been leading me where his grace is abundant, toward the fraternity of PSJS. I pray that God will bless me and my fellow seminarians with the grace needed to be the Lord's voice to the needs of today's Church."



JOHN TANYI **ARCHDIOCESE OF BOSTON**

John comes from the English-speaking region of Cameroon in West/Central Africa. He has a B.A. in Philosophy from Uganda Martyrs University, Nkozi. He attended a Missionary Experience Program for two years in Kenya and went on to earn a

Masters in Peace Studies and International Relations from Hekima University, Nairobi, Kenya. He has taught Political Science and Peace Studies at the Catholic University of Eastern Africa as well as at Mount Kenya University, Nairobi. In 2020 he graduated from Boston College with a Masters in Theology and Ministry.

"I grew up in a traditional Catholic family where daily Mass attendance was a given. My mother woke us up at 5am every day for morning devotion before going to Mass. In many ways, my family was my first seminary and the values and virtues I uphold today were instilled in me by my family. The calling began at the age of seven and never seemed to subside throughout all religious writings and catechesis at University. While at Boston College, I attended a vocation retreat at PSJS and I was convinced it was time for me to continue with my discernment to the priesthood. I am very happy to be in this special seminary and I pray that God will continue to be with me in this formation journey."

ZACHARY ALSPAUGH **ARCHDIOCESE OF NEW YORK**



Zach has a Bachelor of Fine Art in filmmaking from the School of Visual Arts (1996) and a Master of Fine Art from the San Francisco Art Institute (2013). He has photographed six feature length documentary films for his friend, Manny

Kirchheimer. In New York City, before entering the seminary, he worked as an independent cameraman and videographer.

The church used its steps as a sanctuary for the homeless. MICHAEL YOUNG DIOCESE OF VENICE



suing an academic career, studying classical languages (Ancient Greek and Latin) at the University of Oklahoma. He then entered graduate school at Boston College where he studied Medieval Theology - mostly the theology of St. Thomas Aquinas.

"I converted to Catholicism at the age of 16 and spent five years in seminary formation after high school before discerning to leave for a period of six years. Once I completed my graduate studies at Boston College I returned to formation, living in a parish for a year plus two years studying at St. John Vianney in Denver. My archbishop recently determined that the strong formation program at PSJS was a better fit for continuing my formation for priesthood. I agree. and it's great to be back in New England!"





STEPHEN MULLANEY DIOCESE OF WORCESTER

Before entering the Seminary, Stephen had a successful career for over 30 years as a civil engineer. For the last 16 years, he operated his own business. He held leadership positions at the regional chamber of commerce for the last 9

years and was a long-time caregiver to his grandparents and parents.

"My circuitous route to seminary began with initial strong encouragement from my grandfather, and continued throughout my life; I served readily as a lector, Eucharistic Minister, and student at the local central Catholic high school, where a priest asked me to consider ministry, but I was intent on civil engineering. I deepened my involvement in parish ministries and committees. Eventually, I studied for the permanent diaconate before stepping aside to care for my disabled father. After his death, and after increasing unsolicited encouragement from priests and several laypeople, I discerned that God may be calling me to priesthood, leading me, at age 52, to PSJS."
