

FROM THE RECTOR



My dear friends,

The tension in our world is escalating each day as people and countries resort to violence as the way to resolve conflicts or to settle scores. As we have witnessed so often, this only leads to more violence and does not resolve anything but makes matters increasingly worse. The world that we live in, whether it recognizes it or not, needs our Savior and His Gos-

pel in order to realize that true peace comes from accepting Jesus' command to love one another as He loves us. But, as St. Paul says, how can the world know of His Gospel if there are not messengers to bring it? The Lord Jesus has said that "*the harvest is full, but laborers are scarce*," and that truth has never been more obvious than it is today when people are desperately seeking quick solutions to complex issues. They can't know that the solution is CHRIST, Who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life, simply because they have never encountered HIM. The world can't embrace Jesus' message and live according to it because they have not been able to hear it proclaimed.

That proclamation does not come through words alone but through the pastoral ministry of ordained priests. The priest stands "*in persona Christi*," representing Jesus in everything that he does. He brings the healing presence of Christ to the bed of one sick in the hospital or at home, he brings the compassion and mercy of Christ through the Sacrament of Reconciliation and Penance, he brings the pledge of Christ to sustain married couples on their journey and help them to manifest their love by the gift of children. And, standing at the Altar and using Christ's words, he brings Jesus' own Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity to feed God's people with the imperishable Food that will guide them on their way to His Kingdom. A French priest, Fr. Henri Lacordaire, O.P., once wrote, "*My God what a life, and it is Yours, O priest of God!*", and any of us privileged enough to have been called to this life would certainly and resoundingly agree.

Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary exists to form men who can become true disciples of Jesus and bring His message to a waiting world. We take pride in providing an individual formation program that considers a man's history, his life experiences, and his career, and using those criteria to form men "after the mind and heart of Christ". Interestingly, 93% of the men who come to this Seminary complete their formation and become ordained as priests and of that number, 94% remain in active priestly service until their retirement. That would seem to indicate that our mission of forming older men to become priests has been relatively successful and for that, I am grateful to all of you for your prayers, your unfailing generosity, and constant support. I know that we could not fulfill our unique mission of forming older men to serve as priests of Jesus Christ without you.

Celebrating A Church Forever Young: Reflections on WYD Lisbon 2023

Pope Francis, at World Youth Day Lisbon 2023, proclaimed that "Love is at the center" of our lives as Christians. Three PSJS seminarians, Deacon Greg Dougherty '23 and Pat Long '24 (both from Venice, FL), and Deacon Joseph Gonzalez '23 (Washington, DC) were at the center of this year's worldwide pilgrimage and shared some of their reflections.

Each of the men was invited to attend, either by a pastor or

their bishop. The Washington group, numbering 28 (mostly teens and young adults) preceded its WYD experience with a pilgrimage to Santiago Compostela, while the Venice contingent of 52 seminarians and youth first journeyed to Fatima and Santarem, the site of a recurring miracle of the Most Precious Blood.

This was Deacon Greg's first WYD experience, which was accentuated by his group's pilgrimages to Santarem and Fatima, where they were able to

pray the Stations of the Cross in the Cova da Iria, the site of the apparitions. Deacon Greg also had the privilege of ministering as deacon for Mass at the Shrine's Chapel of Apparitions with his Bishop as the Main Celebrant. Although COVID forced Deacon Greg to miss many WYD events, he was struck by the "youthful exuberance and the sheer numbers" of pilgrims. While his illness prompted him to reflect on the redemptive value of suffering, Deacon Greg also reclaimed from WYD both inspiration in witnessing the transmission of the Faith to our youth and hope from their fervent embrace of its beauty.

Both Pat and Deacon Joe had attended some previous WYD gatherings, from which they drew distinct graces. Deacon Joe's group, fresh off a pilgrimage to Santiago Compostela

just prior to WYD, was blessed with an invitation to assist in the distribution of Holy Communion at the Mass with Pope Francis. The youth were enthused by the multitudes of Catholics from around the world as they realized they are part of the Universal Church. They also were moved by participating in Adoration with the Pope. Pat's group shared a similar experience, and were stirred by the faith and enthusiasm of the pilgrims.


Our seminarians took from their WYD




JOSEPH KOLCUN Diocese of Syracuse Class of 2027


Capuchin Franciscans (Denver) Class of 2027

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


BAO NGUYEN Diocese of Venice Class of 2027


Seminarian finds Healing Ministry and Deepens His Formation

Deacon Steve Mullaney is a fourth-year seminarian, in formation for the Diocese of Worcester. Over the past two summers, Deacon Steve has witnessed and participated in the healing of many local Catholics.

"Since July 2022, I have been a participant in the Archangel St. Raphael Holy Healing Ministry. I am one of the ministers involved in hands-on healing prayers with individuals at the healing service held at St. Gabriel the Archangel Church in Upton ... I typically also provide the introductory remarks ahead of locutionist



2023 and is instrumental in awakening many healing encounters for parishioners and others throughout New England. Fr. Tom and his team of healers pray with visitors for healing from physical illness, mental health, anxiety, depression, addiction, dependence, insomnia, fear, injury, pain, loss of a loved one, healing from broken relationships and spiritual attacks. When presented the assignment from Cardinal Seán O'Malley, OFM Cap., the Archbishop of Boston, Fr. Tom was told by the

Cardinal: "your mission is to develop a center for healing" in the Archdiocese of Boston. What Fr. Tom has heard so often from visitors in the short time the Shrine has been established is, "I come here because I find a real special peace", especially during times of Eucharistic Adoration. A near-term goal for Fr. Tom is to build an Adoration Chapel at the



Record-Breaking Year at the Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary 42nd Annual Lawn Party


On Wednesday evening, September 27th, over 300 guests gathered in the Mary Courtyard to celebrate the formation of Catholic priests at Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary - raising record revenue of over \$400,000 to support the formation program.

His Eminence Cardinal Seán O'Malley, Archbishop of Boston and Chairman of the Board, hosts the evening every year but this year he was called to Rome. We were honored to have Bishop Mark O'Connell, Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia, host the event in Cardinal Seán's absence. Mary Anne and Dan Lagan of Natick were the Lawn Party Chairpersons. Dan spoke to the guests about why his family supports this unique Seminary and these future priests.

Pat Bruen is a seminarian in formation for the Archdiocese of Detroit and he addressed the attendees with his vocation story. Pat has a technical background and worked for many years in the IT field. He was married for 40 years and raised three children who are all married. Pat is the proud grandfather of 14 with another one on the way. When his wife passed away, leaning on a faith that always sustained him, he began to feel called to the priesthood. He did not think it was possible at first, but Pope Saint John XXIII Seminary gave him the option. Pat's outstanding talk resonated in people's hearts, and you could almost hear a pin drop as we listened in rapt attention.

We gathered under the tent for enjoyable conversation, music, and wonderful food with many alumni, benefactors, and seminarians. Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary is grateful to all who donated to support the formation of future priests and making this a record-breaking fundraising year for the Seminary.





Pacem in Terris is the signature encyclical of Pope St. John XXIII issued on April 11, 1963. The encyclical was delivered to the Universal Catholic Church and to all people of good will with a shared message on establishing universal peace in truth, justice, charity, and liberty. It is a solemn recognition of the personal dignity of every human being.

In 2023, in appreciation of the 60th Anniversary of the encyclical, Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary established the *Pacem In Terris* Award. Recipients of the award exemplify the spirit of Pope St. John XXIII with the way in which they live their life as well as their active support of the mission of Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary. Sacred Heart of Jesus, Have Mercy on Us.

Condensed version of speech delivered by Pat Bruen '25 at the 42nd Annual Lawn Party

Gratitude is important. He loves me and I am eternally grateful! I try to have an attitude of gratitude when I can. When Jesus appeared to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque in the 1600s, He showed her his Sacred Heart on fire with love for mankind. The purpose of the resulting devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is to focus our hearts on receiving and returning His love with gratitude, gratitude that sadly, is often ignored or treated with contempt.

In fact, it was the Sacred Heart of Jesus that drew me into my priestly vocation. I am a widower. I was married for 40 years. I have three children and 14 grandchildren plus one on the way. I'm learning that there are many similarities between a priestly vocation and the vocation of a married father. Both are vocations, which means God calls us to both. Whether we realize it or not, we are drawn, by God's plan, into our lives. The more we acquiesce to God's plan the happier we are. The more grateful for our vocation, whatever it is or however it feels at the moment, the more we are able to hand it over to the Lord. I am very grateful for both of my vocations.

Here is what happened. Around the time when my wife began hospice care, the image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus began to come to me. I began to notice all of the statues and the paintings of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. It began to haunt me, and I didn't know why.

We could not have a funeral mass because of Covid so I called a friend of mine who is a priest about scheduling a memorial mass in a couple of months and I asked him about this manifestation of the Sacred Heart in my mind and he said, "Well, you know the seminary in Detroit is called Sacred Heart. Maybe you have a vocation." I'm embarrassed to say, I laughed in his face. But the idea began to become ingrained in my heart. I eventually reached out to the vocation's director. There were a number of obstacles to overcome if I were to become a priest...But one by one each obstacle fell out of the way, and it actually happened that I entered the seminary in the fall of 2021.




Let me quickly add that I am in this seminary with many men that have similar stories. Unless my friend had told me about John XXIII, I would not have known, but a vocation for a man in his fifties or even early 60s *is* possible. If you know someone who might be a candidate, I encourage you to talk to them. They likely don't know that possibility. Maybe you can be that seed. I will be grateful for that as I know the Rector will.

If all goes according to plan, I will be ordained a deacon in May, then a priest the following year, the spring of 2025. I will be 68 years old. Every day I ask the Lord, "What are you doing with this old man? And what is your will for me?" I continue to look to the devotion of the Sacred Heart of Jesus for guidance. I pray that God's will be done in all things, and I ask that you pray for me.

I am so grateful to you for supporting this wonderful place. When my wife died, the Lord took a piece of my heart....I realized, the only way to make my heart whole again was to give the rest of it to him so that with the help of His Sacred Heart, I could be healed. That is why I feel so blessed to be able to stand here before you to thank you. To thank you for the men who are studying here today, who would not be here without your help. But I also have a very personal thank you for you. Thank you for helping heal that hole in my heart.

I pray that the Sacred Heart of Jesus will look down on us and give a special blessing to you and to everyone in this exceptional place.

A Reflection on Saints

During the month of No-

vember, the Church turns her thoughts to those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith. We honor All Saints and All Souls. We pray with them and for them. In many ways those gone before us are always with us, make no mistake about it - "we are surrounded by a cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12: 1). They are there with us and for us and we are with them.

On the road we have set out on – here at Pope St. John in particular - we hear the call to holiness. All the faithful have received the universal call to holiness (LG 39). St. Paul urges us to "put on the heart of mercy, kindness, humility, meekness, patience...possess the fruits of the Spirit"(Col. 3: 12. Gal. 5:22). The program of priestly formation calls seminarians to be men of communion. Here we work, study and pray to build up the Church and to lead all souls to Christ. What a blessed venture and road we travel! As we journey that road, listening to that call, we are ever mindful of the admonition of St. Gregory of Nazianzus (+390) "to be, rather than appear to be, a friend of God."

Each of us can have our own patron saints. It may be the one for whom we are named after, the name of the saint we took at Confirmation, our home par-

ish, a society, a club or a sport we enjoy. It's good to know the saints. St. Gregory the Great (+604) shaped much of my priesthood. I studied him in the seminary along with his famous Rule of Life (Regula Pastoralis) on how to be a good priest. I still read and study the extraordinary work of this great pope. His Rule shaped the way the Church trained men to be priests for almost a thousand years. For many years the priesthood sent me to serve sailors and Marines as a Navy Chaplain. Chaplains of all sorts owe much to St. Martin of Tours (+397). The legendary story tells us that as a soldier in the Roman Army, St. Martin cut his great cloak and gave half to a beggar. Later, Christ appeared to him in a dream wearing the cloak. In time, the remnants were stored in a small chapel, and it is from that act the term "chaplain" developed. We remember St. Martin of Tours on November 11, Veterans Day, a day chosen because of his enormous influence as a man of peace and reconciliation.

May this November be a time of grace and communion with All the Saints and All Souls, and especially the saints to whom you are close. May they be a spark of light in your life and those dear to you.
