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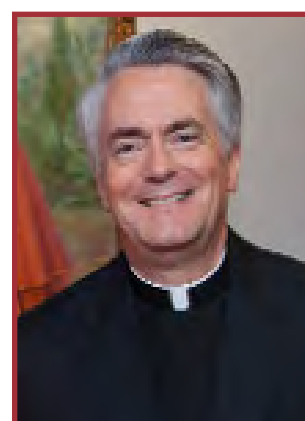

Groundbreaking Slated for June 3



You are looking at a rendering of the Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary Learning Center. The groundbreaking is scheduled for Wednesday, June 3 and the building will be completed (weather permitting!) by Christmas.

This two-story, 10,000 square foot facility is much more than a library. It is part of an overall plan to meet our ever-increasing seminarian enrollment. Simply put, we are running out of space and, in particular, seminarian rooms. With this new library we will repurpose the old library into faculty offices, an expanded athletic facility and much needed conference and study space. This, in turn, frees up seminarian rooms that are currently in use by the faculty.

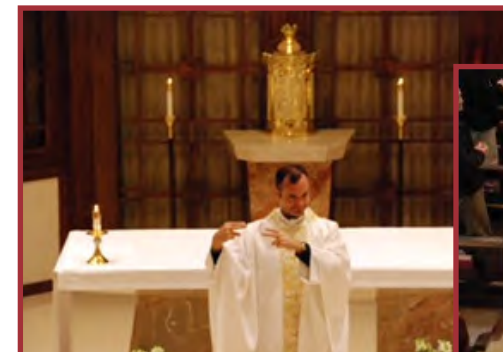

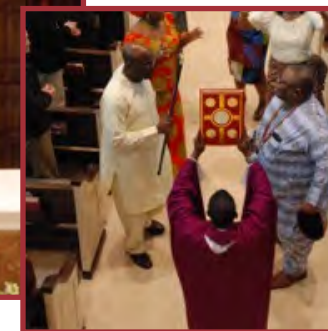

Papal Honors for 2001 Alumnus

November 2014 was a blessed month for Rev. Michael Morgan, a 2001 grad of Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary.

On November 24, Pope Francis bestowed the honor of "Chaplain to His Holiness" on Father Morgan, making him a Monsignor in recognition of distinguished service to the Church. As if that wasn't big enough news, Msgr. Morgan also was named Canonical Legal Advisor to Archbishop Carlo M. Viganò, the Apostolic Nuncio to the United States. Morgan, a former U.S. Army colonel before entering the seminary, assumed the new position in Washington, D.C. in January. He previously had served 13 years in the Diocese of St. Augustine.

In his new post, Msgr. Morgan advises the apostolic nuncio on diplomatic relations with the government, and communications with American churches and the Washington-based Organization of American States.

"This is a great honor for Msgr. Morgan – one that he deserves for his dedicated service to the church," said Bishop Felipe J. Estévez, of the Diocese of St. Augustine, where Morgan served as vicar general and chancellor until his new assignment.

Msgr. Morgan credits Pope Saint John XXIII National Seminary for playing a major role in preparing him for the success he has achieved.

"I am very thankful for the formation I received at Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary for several reasons," Morgan said. "The formation is geared to the diocesan priest, and life and ministry in a diocese; you might say to

life and ministry 'in the trenches.' I think that is very valuable, and it is not something that is the focus at every seminary. Though no seminary prepares you for all of the situations you will encounter, I think this diocesan focus allowed me to feel as prepared as any school environment can make you. I would also have to say that the formation process at Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary truly did respect and take into account our life experiences, and the varied career and professional backgrounds which the seminarians brought with them certainly enriched the experience."

Prior to the seminary, Msgr. Morgan completed a distinguished 26 year Army career, rising in the ranks from platoon leader to colonel before retirement to follow the call to the priesthood in 1996. Msgr. Morgan also served as a member of the Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary Board of Trustees.

DIOCESE OF COLORADO SPRINGS

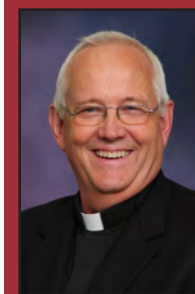
Prior to entering the seminary, Greg was a pharmaceutical sales representative and a commercial insurance agent.

DIOCESE OF PORTLAND

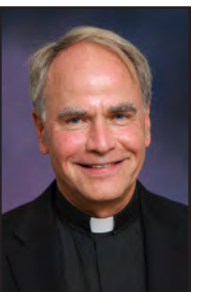
Prior to entering the seminary, Steven was the head swimming coach at Georgetown University.

Ordinations Cap Historic 50th Year at XXIII

After an exciting year highlighted by the 50th anniversary of Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary, 11 transitional deacons of the Class of 2015 are preparing to bloom from the seeds planted and nurtured during their years of priestly formation.

Did you know that the word "seminary" derives from the Latin word "seminarium," which means seedbed.

As the semester ends, Jim Cardosi and Kevin Mulligan, former high school classmates, will be ordained priests together on May 16 at the Cathedral Basilica of Ss. Peter & Paul in Philadelphia. Four other priesthood ordinations will follow in May, including Chris Lowe on May 23 for the Archdiocese of Boston (Cathedral of the Holy Cross); David Skoblow on May 23 for the Diocese of Metuchen, N.J. (St. Francis of Assisi Cathedral); and on May 30, Greg Bierbaum (Diocese of Colorado Springs) and Russ Mower (Diocese of Dallas) will join their classmates as ordained priests. Bierbaum will be ordained at St. Mary's Cathedral in Colorado Springs and Mower will have hands laid upon him at the Cathedral Shrine of the Virgin of Guadalupe in Dallas.

The summer will be one of celebration, as well, as four more deacons become priests. Deacon Steven Cartwright, from the Diocese of Portland, will lead off June ordinations on June 13 at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Maine. The month will close with three new New York priests from XXIII, including (in order) Michael Fowler on June 20 at Sacred Heart Cathedral in the Diocese of Rochester; followed by Rick Lesser on June 20 in the Diocese of Albany's Cathedral of the Immaculate Con-

ception; and a week later on June 27, Mark Matthias will be ordained a priest for the Diocese of Brooklyn in Brooklyn's Co-Cathedral of St. Joseph.

The wait will no doubt make Sept. 12 more special for the final member of the Class of '15 to be ordained a priest this year, as Brother Aidan McDermott will be ordained a priest for his order of Benedictine Monks, at the Abbey of St. Mary and St. Louis in St. Louis.

The Class of 2016 saw its first member to be ordained



a deacon on April 18, when Kevin Yarnell traveled home to be ordained for the Diocese of St. Petersburg, Fla. The seminary community joyfully celebrated Deacon Kevin's first Mass as a deacon on April 23 in XXIII's Alumni Chapel. At press time, three other deacons-elect from Theology III had received their calls to orders and were preparing for their diaconate ordinations in May, including Jorge Rocha (Diocese of Providence), May 16; and Diocese of Albany classmates Steve Matthews and Patrick Rice on May 23.

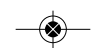
Around the Seminary...

Seminarian Corner...

-Record Snow Couldn't Keep Classmates from Climbing

The record New England snowfall of 2015 was not enough to keep Kevin Yarnell (Diocese of Tampa) and Brian O'Shaughnessy (Diocese of Savannah) indoors this winter. The Theology III friends took their enjoyment of hiking to new heights this year in tackling some of New England's imposing mountain climbs. Yarnell reflects on their wintry adventures and together they ranked their top 5 ascents for those wishing to one day take on a similar challenge.

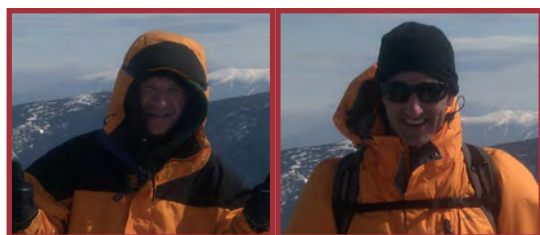

As a Floridian, my dislike of cold weather is well known. In spite of that, Brian O'Shaughnessy and I have now scaled the highest points in Massachusetts, Connecticut and Vermont -- all in sub-freezing temperatures.

The origins of this odd behavior go back to two climbs of Mt. Monadnock in New Hampshire last fall. The first, a group trip by a few seminarians, had been called off due to rain and potential stormy weather on the mountain. Brian didn't see the weather as a deal-breaker, so the two of us drove off and completed the climb with remarkably little difficulty. About a month later we repeated the climb in a snow storm. Those two experiences, framed by their difficult conditions, set the stage for Brian's idea of climbing to the highest point in the six New England states.

We've learned a lot of practical things on the three climbs. The funniest may be the simple fact that energy bars freeze. We had packed a half dozen for our first climb up Mt. Greylock, at 3,491 feet the highest peak in Mass., but only ate two. When we got to the summit and pulled out the others to eat we discovered the bars had frozen to the point where I feared breaking a tooth! So cold was it that even sucking on the bar during the descent did little to soften it. We've packed sandwiches since, which fare better in the cold.

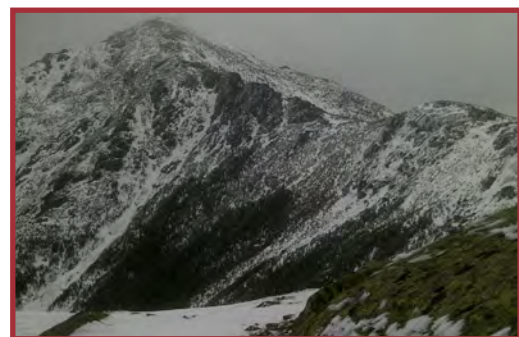
We've also derived spiritual insights on our adventures. Many of the Church Fathers wrote of creation as being God's first revelation and we've seen some amazing illustrations of that. On Mt. Greylock, for example, we came across a grove of small pine trees covered in ice crystals. A bright sun and clear, deep blue sky created a striking illustration of God's wondrous creation.

There's also the raw challenge. We've been cold, tired, up to our chests in snow, and at times have lost the marked trail. Why do it, you wonder? In part, it is out of gratitude to God, who gave us the ability to do something so physically demanding. It reminds us of our calling to utilize all the gifts God has given us - especially when it's difficult. As we approach Diaconate ordination and anticipate serving God's people in new ways, it is good for us to realize that, metaphorically, God wants us "on the mountain" and not in a warm dorm room.

Up next? We're hoping to gain some experience on other mountains in New Hampshire and then take a shot at Mt. Washington, the highest point in the entire northeast. More adventure and insights undoubtedly await.

Kevin & Brian's Top 5...

5. **Bear Mountain**, Salisbury, Conn. (2,323 ft.) highest summit in Conn.; made our own trail up the mountain; saw bear tracks!
4. **Mt. Monadnock**, Jaffrey, N.H. (3,165 ft.) White Mounains of N.H. Said to be the 3rd most climbed mountain in the world; climbed in a steady snow; really windy at the top!
3. **Mt. Greylock**, Adams, Mass. (3,491 ft.): The highest point in Mass.; our longest day 9.5 hours of hiking; incredibly blue sky on the ascent; we learn that energy bars and water bottles freeze.
2. **Mt. Mansfield**, Stowe, Vt. (4,393 ft.) Green Mountains highest point in VT; summit obscured by low clouds; nearly turned back by icy conditions on the upper slopes; no view at the top but a great feeling to be there!
1. **Mt. Lafayette**, Franconia, N.H. (5,260 ft.) and Mt. Lincoln (5,089 ft.) in NH; in the Franconia Range of the White Mountain National Forest...our highest climbs to date and our first taste of alpine conditions; the clear, sunny day allowed for incredible views.

Abbey of St. Mary & St. Louis in St. Louis

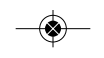

JOHN SCOTT

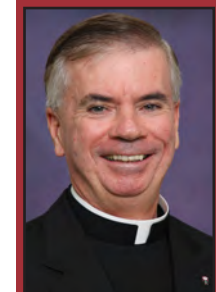
DIOCESE OF ANTIGONISH, N.S.
