

endowment


The extensive renovations to the Seminary Chapel and entryway are well underway. When we begin the upcoming academic year, our seminarians will be welcomed into a 'brand new' Seminary Chapel. The updates will include new pews, flooring, heating, ventilation and lighting.

Additionally, the altar will be lowered to the sanctuary level, providing improved safety and handicap access. There will also be a newly-configured balcony with a transparent wall offering improved visibility.

Several of our alumni have already made generous gifts to underwrite the cost of the Chapel renovations. One such alumnus donor is Rev. James Walker, '99, who came to our

Seminary after a 33-year teaching career.

Fr. Walker is currently the Vicar General of the Diocese of Gallup in New Mexico. We are grateful to Fr. Walker for his \$25,000 gift and hope that additional alumni contributions will allow us to designate our new Chapel in their honor - as the *Alumni Chapel*.

Ordination of Deacons - An Important Step in the Formation Journey

Our seminarians have ministries conferred upon them each year during their formation journey. These include Acolyte in first theology, Reader in second and Admission to Candidacy in third theology – in prepartion for their ordination to the Diaconate and Priesthood in their home dioceses. Having previously focused on the other ministries, we now explore the Diaconate in this edition of our Newsletter.

"These important ministries mark the formative progression of our seminarians as they prepare for priestly ordination. Admission to the Diaconate is especially significant, as it marks the transition of the seminarians from the laity – to new members of the clergy," said Rev. William B. Palardy, Rector of Blessed John XXIII Seminary.

In acknowledgement of their ordained status, these new deacons perform several religious rites: conferring Baptism, assisting at and blessing marriages, distributing the Eucharist, officiating at funeral and burial rites, and bringing Viaticum to the dying.

From the early apostolic times, the Catholic Church has held

the Holy Order of the Diaconate in high honor.

Seminarians to be ordained must be called to the Diaconate beforehand by the Bishop of their diocese or by their religious superior. Candidates for the Diaconate also prepare themselves by making a retreat of at least five days.

The Ordination is celebrated during Mass, between the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Those to be ordained wear a white alb, with a cincture tied around their waists.


After the Gospel reading, a priest requests that the Bishop ordain the candidates. The candidates, in the presence of the faithful, express their resolve to carry out their office in accord with the mind of Christ and the Church, under the direction of the Bishop.

Even those who have pronounced a vow of perpetual chastity in a religious institution are bound to declare publicly this commitment to celibacy during their ordination. By their free acceptance of celibacy, candidates for the Diaconate are consecrated in a new way to Christ. Deacons are ordained by the laying on of hands by the Bishop and the Prayer of Ordination so that, through sacramental grace, they may effectively fulfill their ministry. This tradition has been handed down from the Apostles.

Immediately after the Prayer of Ordination, the new deacons are vested with the diaconal stole and dalmatic as symbols of their admission to the clergy. The presentation of the Book of Gospels signifies that the new deacons will proclaim the Gospel in liturgical celebrations. By his fraternal kiss, the Bishop seals the deacons' admittance into this ministry.

Then, during the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the new deacons exercise their ministry for the first time as they assist the Bishop by preparing the altar, assisting with the Mass, and distributing Holy Communion.

Seminarian Scott L. VanDerveer was ordained a deacon in his home diocese on May 26, 2012. Here he discusses his new role during his summer assignment at the Saints Anthony & Joseph Parish in Herkimer, NY and Holy Family Parish in Little Falls, NY.

"The learning curve for a new deacon is steep! Each day I'm doing something in the liturgy for the first time.

In these first few weeks of my summer assignment, most of my attention has been spent on serving as a deacon for weekend Masses, but soon I'll be celebrating baptisms and leading wake and graveside services.

I have been relying heavily on my thorough liturgical training at Blessed John XXIII. I'm seeing first-hand how important all the details are in liturgy!"


31st Annual Lawn Party - September 19, 2012
