


FROM THE RECTOR

Gelling to Know... Rev. Joseph Zwosta, Director of Intellectual Formation and Academic Dean



In May 2022, Rector Rev. Brian Kiely appointed Rev. Joseph Zwosta, from the Diocese of Brooklyn, to the role of Director of Intellectual Formation & Academic Dean. Sparks of Light would like to introduce you to this wonderful priest.

Tell us a little about your background

I was born and raised in Brooklyn, New York with loving parents, three wonderful siblings, and a large extended family. I discerned a call to the priesthood while studying at Georgetown University and entered the seminary after graduation. After a year studying philosophy, my bishop asked me to continue my theological studies in Rome. I was ordained a priest in 2012 and subsequently earned a licentiate and doctorate in sacred theology at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas (the Angelicum). In between my studies, I spent several fulfilling years working in parishes in my home diocese.

How will you serve the PSJS community in your new role as Director of Intellectual Formation and Academic Dean?

This is my third year serving as a professor and formator of seminarians here as PSJS. I have enjoyed both roles immensely. Now I have the opportunity also to serve as Director of Intellectual Formation and Academic Dean. In this new job, I work closely with professors, seminarians, and staff to ensure that we provide solid philosophical and theological education to our future priests. Thankfully, our program was functioning very well when I took over, so my job is mainly to keep it going in the right direction! The overarching goal of intellectual formation at PSJS is that our seminarians learn more about the Lord, so that they can love Him more deeply and serve Him and His Church more effectively. We are all striving to be, in the words of Benedict XVI's episcopal motto, "co-workers with the truth."

Which dimensions of PSJS have been beneficial to your priestly identity?

First, the example of my brother priests on the faculty has been

inspirational. They are great examples of faithful service to the


Church and of priestly fraternity. Second, the dedication of the seminarians to follow God's call strengthens my own resolve to live out the gift and mystery of the priesthood. Third, the intellectual and spiritual life of the community challenge me to grow in my own knowledge and love of Christ each day.

What insight would you offer to a man discerning a call to the priesthood? How may the faithful encourage priestly vocations?

My advice is to be bold and to answer the call. It will require many sacrifices on your part, but your life will be filled with joy and satisfaction as well. Our seminarians at PSJS come from a wide variety of ages, careers, and life experiences. However, they are all committed to the same goal of preparing to become the faithful priests that the Church needs and deserves. The lay faithful, aside from their prayers and financial generosity, can help to identify and to encourage men (whether younger or older) in their parishes and Catholic organizations that may have a vocation to the priesthood. Sometimes an invitation or word of encouragement is all that a man needs to begin to discern a vocation and to say yes to the call.



Fritz was born in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, to a Catholic

family of five children. Before entering the doors at Pope St. John XXIII, he was a missionary and has worked his way through theological studies toward acceptance for priestly formation here in Weston.

"My parents are very attached to the principles of the Catholic Church, and they enrolled me in the Petit Seminary College Saint Martial (PSCSM) in Port-au-Prince. I took part in a vocational day in my parish with Bishop Lafontant presiding. In his homily, he spoke on vocations, sharing that God sends an invitation to each of us. I was attracted by this and felt within myself that the gospel was addressing me directly. I shared this with my mother, and she told me 'If you really want to become a priest, if you really feel that God chose you, you have to be sincere with God and with yourself. And above all, you have to dive into prayer...' I wondered, how am I going to do it? Leave everything to follow Christ? After meeting with the priest, and especially my spiritual director, I came to understand that the most important thing in life is God."

I was involved with the Prolife groups, Catechism, Life of the World, Cursillo groups, Knight of Columbus, EWTN and The Legionaries of Christ. As I developed a deep sense of my calling to do more for the Church, this calling became louder after going through my annulment process. After all these years, I always felt, since high school, that I wanted to do more for the Lord.... I am happy to discern my vocation at Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary. Great to be here... I just want to do 'God's will'!"




Carlos was born in Valledupar, Colombia. In 2018, he moved to

Seminarians toured the archives of the Archdiocese of Boston in October. In addition to viewing historic documents and artifacts, the seminarians learned the importance of maintaining sacramental and parish records for posterity's sake.

The seminarians were greeted upon their arrival by Bishop Peter Uglietto, Vicar General for the Archdiocese, and rector of Pope St. John XXIII from 2005 to 2010. Thomas Lester, Director of the Archives, and Violet Hurst, Archivist, gave a tour of the shelves, research library, and display cases.

"I was surprised to see a document signed by King Louis XVI of France granting a retainer and teaching faculties to a French priest" said Thomas Rashid class of 2026, from the Archdiocese of Boston. Other highlights on display included the papal document establishing Boston as a separate diocese from Baltimore



in 1808, a ledger recording the personal contribution of President John Adams for the construction of the first Catholic church in New England, and vestments worn by Pope St. John Paul II on his first pastoral visit to Boston in 1979.

Gerald Foley, '26 in formation for Diocese of Brooklyn, offered this assessment: "The tour reminded me of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s observation that we are not the makers of history; rather, we are made by it. The noble and necessary work of safeguarding universal and local Church history is passed to us all."



As a missionary priest, one of my many hats is to visit sick people in the outstations, evaluate them, and pray with and for them after Mass.


Often times I see some Ophthalmology cases. In Zambia, Ophthalmology is a subspecialty that is not practiced too much. My recourse is to take a picture of their eye using my I-phone and to send to an Ophthalmologist in the USA. I had two patients that I had seen recently. I parked at an internet hotspot on the

One patient needed a corneal transplant which was probably not going to happen in Zambia and with the second patient Larry indicated that it was not serious and we discussed some medications that could help her. The second patient responded well to medication and is doing well. With late vocation priest-hoods, you never know when your background will help you in your ministry. I hope to catch up with Larry under more relaxed circumstances another time, but will certainly do so when my next round of Ophthalmology cases arises...

Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary was, and continues to be, saddened by the passing of beloved faculty member Dr. John F. Millard in May of 2022. Fr. Brian Kiely wrote to the faculty, staff, and seminarians a notification of his death, and also shared his remembrances of John:

May 25, 2022

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

It is with a deep sadness that I share with you the news that DR. JOHN F. MILLARD died yesterday, May 24th, in Rhode Island.




Next Step Achieved - Ordained a Transitional Deacon




