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Introducing a New Course: Parish Governance

Here at Pope Saint John XXIII National Seminary, we're always working on a goal to provide seminarians with the best, well-rounded curriculum of studies and formation available so as to ensure their readiness to take on just about any challenge they may face in priestly ministry, starting on ordination day. This Spring 2023 semester our 4th Theologian deacons had a new required course aimed at achieving that goal called Parish Governance.

The role of the parish priest has changed dramatically in the last century. Changing demographics, the rise in secularism, and decline in priestly vocations presents many challenges to priests in active ministry. Keenly aware of this reality, our Dean of Intellectual Formation, Father Joseph Zwosta, in collaboration with a brother priest of the Diocese of Brooklyn, New York, Father Christopher Heanue, created our new Parish Governance course to give our graduating deacons an occasion to recognize the opportunities and difficulties they will soon face in their priestly ministry.

Through the generosity of Bishop Robert Brennan, Father Heanue, rector of the Co-Cathedral of Saint Joseph – Saint Theresa of Avila in Brooklyn, was able to

come teach Parish Governance at PSJS over two weeks of intensive on-site classes along with four weeks of classes and presentations via Zoom meetings.

Father Heanue laid a firm foundation during the first two classes by exploring both 'What is your mission to be a priest?' along with 'What is the mission of your parish?' Our deacons discovered that the answers to these questions must be known first, as a priest's understanding of his own mission, and then the mission of his parish will govern how he will shepherd the spiritual and physical needs of his parish flock, staff, and facilities. Father Heanue had several lay faithful who serve the greater diocesan-wide needs of the Diocese of Brooklyn meet via Zoom with our deacons on topics of key importance in priestly ministry: Stewardship & Fundraising, Executive Coaching, Human Resource administration, Evangelization & Social Media, Buildings & Maintenance, and Parish Finances.

To help our deacons put together all of what they learned Father Heanue dedicated the final class to working with them through a couple of parish management challenges taken from Father Heanue's own experiences of priestly ministry in several churches where he has served.

To say our deacons really appreciated Father Heanue, all the presenters, and all of the pastoral and practical knowledge they gained through our Parish Governance course would be an understatement. Every deacon gained not only knowledge and wisdom about the joys and challenges of parish governance, but also gained confidence in their individual abilities and gifts to serve their future parish flocks.



A Night of Spreading God's Love in Lawrence, Massachusetts

In partnership with the Order of Malta, Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary participated in a three-night volunteering event to help the homeless of Lawrence, Massachusetts. Every Wednesday, The Movement Family (TMF) reserves space for this vulnerable population to come and gather for food and companionship. One Wednesday a month, Pope St. John XXIII participates. To assist in the overall effort, Seminary community members and volunteers from the Order of Malta make 100 bags of lunches that includes a sandwich, chips, an

apple and cookies – along with a notecard with words of encouragement so the recipients know they are loved. We asked John Ippolito, one of the participants in this year's mission work, to reflect on what he witnessed and felt one Wednesday night in Lawrence. The Seminary plans to continue this volunteer effort throughout the next academic year.

On Wednesday the 15th of February 2023, several

members of the faculty, staff, and seminarian community of Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary gathered together and embarked upon a mission journeying to Buckley Transportation Center in Lawrence, Massachusetts to assist The Movement Family (TMF), a Christian action group, with their efforts serving the vulnerable of Lawrence. TMF members are highly connected to this community and are the voice for those who suffer from poverty, drug and alcohol addiction, and cognitive disorders. Those who were served had the opportunity to receive the things they so desperately needed such as food, drink, clothing, and medical treatment. Music, games, and

haircuts were also provided. The environment radiated a tangible sense of joy and peace. This was a chance for all volunteers to serve others in a real and practical way, providing a sense of humility and the opportunity to recognize that not everyone has all that they need.

Being part of the community that TMF has established was an extraordinary experience. The guests seemed to feel loved and cared for by the volunteers. They had smiles on their faces

AROUND THE SEMINARY








February 1

Diocese of Brooklyn | Ordination: June 3, 2023




a positive impact. It's what, I feel, makes this Seminary so authentic.

Diocese of Worcester | Ordination: June 3, 2023



Deacon Edgar Serrano


Diocese of Orlando | Ordination: May 27, 2023


may not know off hand the answer to a particular problem or question, I do now have the resources to know where and how to find the answer. For me, this is invaluable.

The Seminary program is based on the *Ratio Fundamentalis* of the Holy See, the Program of Priestly Formation Fifth Edition, of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Post-Synodal Exhortation of Pope St. John Paul II, *Pastores Dabo Vobis*.

DIOCESES SERVED

To date, candidates have come to the Seminary from more than 140 dioceses and 23 religious communities. Over 730 alumni serve in dioceses and religious communities throughout the world.
